



Things to See & Do in Bermuda!



Bermuda is a magical destination for both sun worshipers and history buffs, boasting some of the most beautiful beaches in the world, and the oldest settlement in the Western Hemisphere. Throw in shopping, museums, a renowned aquarium and zoo, and unique natural attractions, and you'll quickly see why a cruise to Bermuda offers truly something for everyone!

With two overnights and three full days in port, this itinerary lets you thoroughly experience Bermuda, including its spectacular sunsets and unique nightlife. You'll also enjoy your sea days aboard Norwegian Joy with her many activities like a two-level race track and Broadway entertainment, including Footloose. In Bermuda, exploring is a breeze as your ship docks right at the Royal Naval Dockyard, so most everything is steps away, including access to the pink sand beaches.

Royal Naval Dockyard & The West End

One of Bermuda's most popular destinations, the historic **Royal Naval Dockyard** anchors the West End. Once home to the British Royal Navy, the Dockyard has been beautifully repurposed and serves as a hub for sightseeing, shopping, dining, entertainment and an array of island experiences including many artist studios. Nearby, you'll find many of the renowned South Shore beaches, including Warwick Long Bay and breathtaking Horseshoe Bay. The pink sand and warm waters rank this beach consistently as one of the most beautiful in the world. Calm waters and lifeguards on hand make this a great spot for children.

In 1907, two boys playing cricket discovered a small hole in the field spouting warm air. The find was investigated only to discover the **Crystal Caves**, a 30 million-year-old geological feature of white and pink stalactites looming over clear blue water. Visitors to the cave are treated to a colorful display of underground caverns.

Climb up **Gibbs Hill Lighthouse** for panoramic views of the South Shore, and explore the village of Somerset, home to calm bays, candy-colored churches and the most photogenic little drawbridge you'll ever see. Don't miss the chance to try out one of the many water sports offered in and around this gorgeous harbor.

Hamilton & Central Bermuda

Central Bermuda is home to the capital **City of Hamilton**, a harbour town known for its blend of global sophistication, vibrant nightlife and local flavor. Enjoy dining, shopping, dance clubs and the island's most cosmopolitan culture along Front Street downtown, and find great beaches, botanical gardens, lush parks and oceanfront golf nearby.

It wouldn't be an island without sea life, and one of the world's oldest and more regarded aquariums is the **Bermuda Aquarium, Museum and Zoo**. A 140,000-gallon tank holds more than 200 species of fish and one of the largest living coral collections in the world! Adjacent to the aquarium are the museum and zoo. The Natural History Museum features exhibits on Bermuda's ecology and geology. The Zoo boasts more than 300 birds, reptiles and mammals, including species from the islands of the Galapagos and Madagascar.

St. George's & The East End

St. George Island in Bermuda is home to the oldest continually inhabited English settlement in the Western Hemisphere. In 1609, the English ship Sea Venture, bound for the Jamestown Colony in America, wrecked offshore of St. George Island. A permanent settlement was established in 1612. Today it's a UNESCO World Heritage Site complete with historic churches, forts, and museums.

St. Peter's Church is more than 400 years old. Established in 1612, it is the oldest Anglican Church in the Americas. Visitors to the church today will see the altar made of hand-carved red cedar, candlelit chandeliers, an 18th century throne salvaged from a shipwreck and communion silver believed to be more than 900 years old, gifted to the church by King William III in 1697. The church's graveyard has headstones dating back 300 years.

Fort St. Catherine was constructed in 1614, as protection against invaders and pirates. It towers above the pink sand beach where settlers from the Sea Venture came ashore in 1609. Today, the fort has been fully restored. Visitors will enjoy fantastic views from the looming ramparts and are free to explore the towers, period artillery, and tunnels and chambers drilled into the terra firma.

A favorite spot on St. George Island for photographs is the **Unfinished Church**. Construction on the church was started in 1874, but when a tornado tore the roof off the church in 1925, plans were put on hold. The church was never completed.

Nearby, discover many unique natural attractions, including the limestone formations of Tobacco Bay Beach, Tom Moore's Jungle and the Crystal Caves of Bermuda. Cooper's Island Nature Reserve and Ferry Reach National Park are both flush with flora and birdlife, including several rare species.






Broadway
